Deadline for **College Scholarship Applications** Around the Corner

reminder to high school seniors and current college students: Completed application materials for Morgan County REA's college or vocational school scholarship opportunities must be postmarked or delivered to MCREA headquarters by **January 29, 2021.**

MCREA, along with Tri-State Generation and Transmission and Basin Electric Power Cooperative, will sponsor nine college or vocational education scholarships for students who reside in MCREA's service territory boundaries and whose parents or grandparents receive electric service from MCREA.

MCREA will award five \$1,000 scholarships, with Tri-State



offering two \$500 scholarships and Basin Electric sponsoring one \$1,000 scholarship, all for graduating high school seniors. Additionally, MCREA is offering one \$1,000 scholarship to a current postsecondary student who will be returning to a college or trade school.

FIVE WAYS TO **STAY COZY** THIS WINTER
